Doylestown Police Department Makes History First Female in Supervisory Postion

On December 15, 2020, Sergeant Jessica Whiteside was promoted from Patrol Officer to Sergeant and sworn in by Chairman of the Board of Supervisors Barbara Lyons. Sergeant Jessica Whiteside is the first female police officer to be promoted to a supervisory position in the history of the Doylestown Police Department, which was established in 1969. Sergeant Whiteside fills the vacancy left by Lt. Charles Ziegler's promotion. 
Twenty Years of The Doylestown Township Septage Management Program (SMP)

Doylestown Township passed Ordinance No. 299 in 2001. This ordinance requires all residents who have on-lot disposal systems (septic systems) to have them inspected by a Doylestown Township approved pumper/hauler/installer every three years. The SMP is a pumping and reporting program which, after 20 years, continues to be successful within Doylestown Township and has been used as a template by other municipalities.

The Township requires pumper/haulers to re-apply yearly to operate in the Township by submitting their PADEP permit to pump and their Bucks County Health Department license. The Township assures that the operating businesses are licensed and insured, while giving the resident options for service providers. The pumper/hauler is required to submit a pumper's report to the Township. This information is kept on file. The Township works with the approved pumper/haulers to obtain the report and make sure the homeowner is in compliance with the ordinance. Another component of the SMP requires residents, with on lot wells, to test their well water for coliform bacteria. The water test is required every three years and these results must be provided by the homeowner.

Doylestown Township communicates with residents about the program by sending out yearly reminders and providing information on the Township website and newsletter. The Septic Management Program continues to be vital in protecting the health and safety of our residents.




Doylestown township 2021 Budget Highlights

Doylestown Township Board of Supervisors adopted the 2021 Final Budget at their regular meeting on December 15, 2020. As always, the budgeting process started in the spring with the volunteers from our Ways and Means Committee and finance staff all working with the Board of Supervisors to develop a 2020 forecast and our 2021 budget. This year was different however. As we indicated in a previous newsletter, we needed to monitor the potentially negative impact of the COVID Pandemic on our 2020 and beyond financial performance. We believe at this point that we will likely end the year with a minimal impact of less than 1% overall on the entire budget. During the first three quarters of the year, the Township did put a freeze on hiring and deferred some of our capital spending. As 2020 went on we were able to resume some of our capital spending and began to hire some needed replacements within our police, public works and administration departments.

The 2021 Budget has projected Total Revenue of \$16.0 million (m) - \$13.0m Operations, \$2.7m Capital Grants and Loans, \$0.3m Other. The two largest sources of our Operations Revenue are expected to be Earned Income Tax at \$4.2m and Real Estate Taxes at \$3.9m. We also expect to receive state aid of \$1.1m, Permits and fees of \$1.3m, Real Estate Transfer at \$1.2m and a pass-through from our DTMA of \$1.1m. Capital Revenue is expected to be \$1.3m from grants, and \$1.4m in loan proceeds for the Pebble Ridge – Woodridge curbing project.


2021 BUDGET REVENUE by DEPARTMENT

Total Expenditures for 2021 are budgeted at \$18.3m - \$12.5m Operations (for a positive Operating Income of \$0.5m), \$5.2m Capital, \$0.6m Other. The Township will be utilizing \$2.3m from reserves to complete our Capital Programs and balance the budget. Operations spending is police at \$2.8 million, administration at \$2.0m, public works at \$1.0m, fringes at \$3.3m and other operating expenses at \$1.5m. The balance is in our smaller funds like code enforcement, parks and water.

2021 BUDGET EXPENSES by DEPARTMENT



For 2021, we focused on the impact of properly funding the employee defined benefit pension plan, and worked closely with the volunteers from the Pension Advisory Committee to set up a methodology to address that going forward. In addition, we focused on capital programs for the next 5 years especially on our roads and bridges program. We're increasing taxes by .750 mills in 2021 to assist us in completing a more robust road program of \$6.3 million in road restoration over the next 5 years. Some of our other capital projects include replacing the salt storage building and adding to our trail system with funding received from grants.

Lastly, we are planning to allocate funds over the next 5 years to address the needs for our proposed Park & Recreation and Community Center facility. When the time comes we want to have the appropriate borrowing available to accommodate the anticipated \$4.9 million spending beginning in late 2021. In addition, we anticipate utilizing the funds received from the sale of the cell tower lease at the Township Complex to assist with the project.

We appreciate the efforts of Budget Analyst Ed Ebenbach, Finance Director Ken Wallace, our department heads and volunteers for the time they spend working with the Board of Supervisors to present a budget that is comprehensive and addresses the Township's ability to continue to provide the level of service that our residents have come to expect.

Fire Prevention and Safety

During the winter and spring months extra steps must be taken to keep your home and family safe. The lower temperatures and winter storms can cause problems. Fire is fast and it only takes 30 secounds for a small fire to become a large fire producing large volumes of smoke and toxic gases. Here are a few things that will help keep you and your family safe.

- Test all your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, change batteries, and replace detectors every ten years.
- Make sure your house numbers can be seen from the street so if help is needed emergency personnel can locate your home or business.
- If the power goes out, stay away from downed lines. If generators are being used, keep them away from windows, doors and other openings. Do not run generators in or near the garage.
- Have your furnace, fireplace and chimneys cleaned and inspected for safe operation during the winter months. Keep anything that can melt or burn at least 3 feet away from heating units. Dispose of cooled ashes properly in a noncombustible container.
- Do not use extension cords for portable heaters. Keep heaters away from anything that can burn like bedding, walls and furniture.
- Always read manufacturer's instructions for the proper use of electrical devices like holiday lights, kitchen appliances, digital devices and household tools.
- Plan and know two ways out in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and sidewalks of snow and other debris for easy access to your emergency. Have a common meeting place in a safe location outside. Call 911 to report an emergency.

The things you and your family do now could prevent problems in the future. We all want a safe and enjoyable winter and spring.

Tropical Storm Isaias Update



On August 4, 2020, Doylestown Township prepared for Tropical Storm Isaias. The Township experienced something that its never experienced before, an EF2 Tornado.

Several neighborhoods were impacted with damage to their homes, property and downed trees. The largest single impact was to Doylestown Health's Children's Village. The high winds flipped cars, shattered windows and tore into the childcare center. Township Police, Bucks County Sherriff's Department and local fire companies responded to aid in escorting staff and children from the rubble.

It's The Law

Title 75 of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes contains the laws which govern the operation of vehicles on Pennsylvania roads. In Pennsylvania, a bicycle is considered a vehicle and, as such, is governed by a general set of rules (common to all vehicles) and a specific set of rules (designed for bicycles).

Automobiles are <u>not required to yield to bicycles</u> being ridden across a crosswalk (at a trail crossing for example) as the bicycle is treated as a vehicle. A better choice is to dismount and walk your bike across; as a pedestrian **you** have the right-of-way!

Rules To Follow At Trail Crossings:



Stop and yield right-of-way to vehicular traffic on the roadway approaches at trail crossings where posted (Remember! – Trail crossings are posted with stop signs for bicyclists). Consider dismounting and walking your bike; especially at traffic signals and trail crossings with flashing



Yield to pedestrians within the crosswalk. Pedestrians have the right-of-way on shared used trails. You must give an audible signal as you approach and pass a pedestrian.


A Message from Doylestown Township Public Works

Before winter storms occur, the Public Works Department request that if you don't have to be out on the roads, please stay at home. Secondly, we request that residents remove obstructions from public streets or rights-of-way, including but not limited to:

- Parked vehicles
- •Trash/recycling containers, and
- •Basketball hoops

Residents are reminded that plowing or depositing of snow or ice from a private road onto a public street, or right-of-way is prohibited in accordance with the Doylestown Township Code, Chapter 151, Article III, § 151-13.

Public Works also recommends that residents clear their driveways in the following manner as recommended by PennDOT:



During winter storm events, the clearing of snow and ice from public streets and rights-of-way take precedence. Winter bike & hike trail maintenance will be conducted after the public streets and rights-of-way are cleared. Trail users are urged to use caution on all bike & hike trails during and after winter storm events.

Vehicle preparation is another key to successfully navigating winter roads. Winter weather can bring unexpected conditions, so make sure your vehicle is ready for ice and snow. Prior to the winter driving season you should have a mechanic check the brakes, battery, hoses and belts. Below are some additional tips for getting your vehicle ready for winter:



A Message from Doylestown Township Municipal Authority

In December of 2020, the Doylestown Township Municipal Authority (DTMA) completed the rehabilitation and painting of our South One Water Tank located adjacent to Easton Road. Safety improvements and various metal work upgrades to the tank were also achieved. DTMA received a significant PA Small Water and Sewer Program Grant to pay for most of the project. The South One Tank is the first tank in DTMA's system to be painted under our recently updated Tank Maintenance Plan. Performing necessary maintenance on water tanks prolongs the life expectancy of these vital assets and reduces the need for costly replacement. Water tanks store water for our customers, provide necessary water pressure, and are used during fire-fighting.

Also in 2020, DTMA began installing public water in the Pebble Ridge and Woodridge neighborhoods. Homeowners will receive a letter in the mail alerting them when they may connect to the DTMA system. DTMA thanks the residents for their patience during the construction.

Water Quality- Why is groundwater hard?

Did you know the Doylestown Township Municipal Authority provides water to approximately 3,000 customers via ten groundwater production wells? These wells withdraw groundwater from 300 feet to 500 feet below the surface. This groundwater is naturally filtered through the earth's crust. As a result of this natural filtration, dissolved minerals such as calcium and magnesium are present in the water. These minerals cause hardness in the water that is not a health risk but can impact soap and detergent performance and cause mineral buildup on fixtures. 

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
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
