In late August 2021, a tropical storm developed in the Caribbean and it was noted that

the storm had the potential to develop into a tropical cyclone.

It was named 'Ida.' It developed into a Category 4 Atlantic Hurricane making landfall first in Louisiana where it caused devastation second only to Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

As it accelerated up the Atlantic coast, Ida became a post tropical cyclone and it hit our area on September 1 and produced unprecedented rainfall and tropical storm force winds spawning several tornadoes in the Central Bucks region and throughout Northeast Pennsylvania. On August 31, Doylestown Township declared a state of emergency by executive order, unleashing emergency protocols. The night of September 1, Director of Code Enforcement and Emergency Management, Sinclair Salisbury, Police Chief Dean Logan, Township Manager, Stephanie Mason, Fire

Chairman Doylestown Township Board of Supervisors Marshal Rick Schea doubling for public works and myself, as Director of Public Safety, met throughout the night to manage road closures, emergency evacuations, transporting stranded motorists, removing road hazards and anything else Ida threw at us. The morning of September 2, the community woke to the devastation to our homes, vegetation, trees, automobiles, roads and bridges.

ISSUE 2

A significant element in our emergency plan is to provide shelter. The community meeting room was built to serve this purpose. We opened the large meeting room as a temporary shelter which served two stranded motorists, a young man from Philadelphia on his way home from work and a homeless woman named Kathy who lived out of her car, both shivering from sodden clothes and fear. We provided them with blankets and we found a coat for the young man who was picked up by his family early the next morning.

All of Kathy's possessions, her car, her clothes, and her home were lost to the flood waters. She had no place to go and no one to call for help.

After several hours we found a hotel with one room available for one night and Kathy was transported there by Police Sergeant, Jessica Whiteside.

The next morning, Doylestown Township administration, staff and family members of administration folk went into high gear finding temporary housing in local hotels, collecting money for grocery gift cards, buying clothes and essentials for Kathy and making sure she was transported to the next hotel that could be found.

Along the way, I contacted numerous service providers to obtain support for Kathy to help her find work, temporary housing, and transportation. Kathy transitioned from the care of Doylestown Township to the care of the Lenape Valley Foundation. Because of confidentiality, we never heard how Kathy made out.

Until May 19, 2022. It was the day I reserved for the dreaded every four - year trip to the Department of Motor Vehicles in Dublin for my driver's license renewal (with photo).

You know how it goes. You take a number and wait to be called for your photo shoot. When my number was called, I approached the clerk who would take my photo and handed her my license renewal photo card. With that, I heard my name shouted followed by "I thought it was you!"

It was Kathy sitting behind the box camera. Just by happenstance we became reunited. She cried with happiness and gratitude for all the help she received from the Doylestown Township family and then told me it was the first time she smiled in a while because her father had been ill and had just died that day. She told me she is doing well and is looking forward to the opportunity to volunteer at the park in Doylestown

Township, the place that gave her sanctuary during a storm. Kathy gave me permission to tell her story and asked that I thank all those in the Doylestown Township administration and their friends and family for providing safety, comfort and hope in her time of great distress.

Her story is a gift to all of us, especially to me. Every time I look at my driver's license for the next four years, I will think of Kathy who took my photo and told us she was doing okay.

Emergency Preparedness Kit- Are you ready?

It is important to be ready for any type of emergency that may arise and have a kit ready to go in case you are in sudden emergency situation like a weather-related disaster.

- Water (one gallon per person per day)
- Food (supply of nonperishable food)
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio
- Flashlight
- First Aid Kit
- Extra Batteries
- Prescription Medications for a few days
- Cell phone with chargers and backup battery
- Blanket

Doylestown Township recognized as a Tree City USA®

for 23rd Straight Year!

The Arbor Day Foundation Recognizes Doylestown Township as a 2021 Tree City USA® to honor our commitment to effective urban forest management. The Township achieved this designation by meeting the program's four requirements:

- Forming a tree board or department;
- •Creating a tree-care ordinance;
- •Having an annual community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita; and
- •Observing Arbor Day with the annual community event and proclamation.

The Tree City USA® program is sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation, in partnership with the U.S. Forest Service

and the National Association of State Foresters. "Tree City USA communities benefit from the positive effects that an urban tree canopy has year after year," said Dan Lambe, chief executive of the Arbor Day Foundation. "The trees being planted and cared for by Doylestown ensure that generations to come will enjoy a better quality of life. Additional, participation in this program helps cultivate a sense of stewardship and pride for the trees the community plants and cares

There is a myriad of benefits for planting trees in urban trees, these include:

•Urban tree plantings help reduce energy consumption by up to 25%, which will reduce general energy costs and help with overall cooling of the developed areas as well.

- •Members of the community benefit from properly placed trees as they increase property values from 7-20%.
- •Trees also positively affect the local ecosystem by helping to clean water and create animal habitats to encourage biodiversity.

Every year, the Environmental Advisory Council celebrate Arbor Day each year with a tree planting event in April.

This year, the EAC members partnered with students from Central Bucks West National Honor Society to plant trees at Pooles Corner.



Naturalized Basins Benefits the Community

Doylestown Township is in the process of naturalizing basins, which transforms a conventional basin into a natural ecosystem capable of providing habitat improving the water quality and providing aesthetic value. This transformation is a tool that the Township has chosen to use in order to obtain the goals of our Pollutant Reduction Plan (PRP). By reducing and controlling the pollutants in stormwater as part of the PRP, we can ensure that the requirements of our Municipal Storm Sewer System (MS4) program will be met. This program is mandated by the state of Pennsylvania and requires municipalities to implement a series of programs. These programs are intended to reduce the discharge of pollutants from the storm sewer system while protecting water quality.

The Township has identified 26 Township-owned and maintained basins as potential candidates for naturalization. The Township has been evaluating them looking at factors like

functionality, existing vegetation, and maintenance concerns to determine whether or not they will be included in the program. Once the basins are selected for the program, inspection reports will be prepared for recommendations or changes to make moving forward. Basins that are part of the naturalization program will be monitored on an annual or as needed basis. The Township will determine what maintenance changes and modifications need to be made each year.

Currently, three basins were naturalized in 2021 which included Ridings at Covered Bridge Basin on Ridings Lane, Mystic View Lane, and Longwood Circle. If you have any questions regarding naturalized basins, please contact the Township at 215-348-9915.

BENEFITS OF BASIN NATURALIZATION:

- Reduces pollutants in runoff
- Improves water quality
- •Reduces air pollution from gas-powered mower use
- •Reduces maintenance costs
- •Reduces PRP costs
- •Improves groundwater recharge
- Increases infiltration
- •Enhances aesthetics
- •Creates wildlife habitat
- •Removes invasive plants

PLEASE NO DUMPING IN THE BASINS!

There should be no dumping of any kind in the basins whether they are naturalized or not including <u>yard waste</u>.

Naturalized basins are not the same as a compost site. The dumping of yard waste could enable the growth of invasive plants and it will be costly to the Township to remove the invasive plant materials.

Signs are in the process of being posted on naturalized basins to educate the public on this program.



Pennsylvania in Bloom

Native plants are vital components of Pennsylvania's natural ecosystem. In comparison to introduced species (plants that came to the U.S. after European contact) native plants are better adapted to the local climate and conditions, and therefore, are lower maintenance. Native plants face many challenges, such as development, landscaping, and crowding by exotics. Because native plants serve as sources of food and habitat for native species, challenges faced by native plants will surely have a ripple effect on Pennsylvania's wildlife.

You can help preserve Pennsylvania's biodiversity by minimizing habitat disturbance. This includes removing invasives, erosion control, and native plantings. Do not collect native plants from the wild! Instead, purchase nursery-propagated natives. By making the switch, you're doing your part By: Lauren Hahn, Summer Intern

Doylestown Township's EAC Bird Town Program

Birds and West Nile Disease

You may have noticed that you are seeing less birds in your gardens and in Doylestown's parks. There are many reasons for this and decreasing habitat, climate change and disease are some of the major culprits. Unfortunately, there are several diseases that affect birds, West Nile Virus (WNV) being one of them. While WNV can infect people, it is rare and can be avoided and treated. Birds are not so fortunate and WNV continues to cause significant bird population decline, and the declines have been particularly noticeable in the southeast of the state. Unfortunately, It is

believed that as temperatures

warm due to climate change

WNV will become more

prevalent.

WNV is mostly spread by mosquitoes of the genus Culex which prefer to feed on birds. This mosquito is indigenous to Africa but arrived in Pennsylvania in 2000. Mosquitoes become infected with WNV when they bite infected birds. In the past twenty years the virus has been detected in over 250 species of North American birds and we are seeing population declines as a

result.

The best way to help birds is by eliminating mosquito breeding grounds. This can be done by removing standing water where mosquitoes lay eggs. Once a week check all possible items that might hold water, for example, planters, toys, bird baths, garden furniture and even holes in trees and cover all water containers (cisterns, rain barrels, buckets etc.). Safe larvicides have shown success in treating larger bodies of water that won't be used for drinking. To help control the virus, the Pennsylvania departments of Health, Environmental Protection and Agriculture developed a surveillance program using Integrated Pest Management techniques that focus on education, mosquito habitat reduction, surveillance, and control.

If a dead bird is found, use gloves or an inverted bag plastic bag to pick up the bird and dispose of it in the trash. Note, the local Health Department does not need to be contacted.
