### Explore Doylestown Township's Expanding Bike & Hike Trail System This Spring!

As the warmer weather returns, there's no better time to explore the incredible network of trails that wind through Doylestown Township. With over 30 miles of completed trails, our community is dedicated to expanding these connections to seamlessly weave together our beautiful parks, neighborhoods, and key destinations.

One of the latest additions to the trail system is the newly completed Shady Retreat Road Trail, a vital project that enhances pedestrian and bicycle access for residents and students. This shared-use path stretches approximately 1.1 miles along Burpee Road, North Shady Retreat Road, and Limekiln Road.



The Shady Retreat Road Trail is an essential part of the Safe Routes to School initiative, designed to provide safer and more accessible pathways for students traveling to and from schools such as Delaware Valley University, Doyle Elementary School, and Lenape Middle School. Additionally, this new trail connects to existing pathways leading to Central Park and the Route 202 Trail, offering expanded recreational and commuting options for all trail users.

In addition to improving connectivity, the project also enhances safety by addressing pedestrian and bicycle concerns at the intersection of North Shady Retreat Road and Burpee Road. A new three-way stop condition has been implemented at this crossing, ensuring safer passage for cyclists and pedestrians.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony for the Shady Retreat Road Trail took place on November 15th, marking an exciting milestone for the community. Doylestown Township extends heartfelt thanks to Senator Steve Santarsiero, State Representative Tim Brennan, the Board of Supervisors, the Bike & Hike Committee, the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC), and PennDOT for their dedication and efforts in securing grants and resources, including funding from the Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside (TASA) grant program. Their unwavering support has helped bring this project to fruition, creating safer, more accessible roadways and trail connections that benefit everyone.

The Bike  $\theta$  Hike Committee also partnered with the Welding and Collision Repair Technology Class at MBIT to expand the presence of iconic bridge silhouettes on the Bike  $\theta$  Hike trails, including a new installation on the overpass on Limekiln Road. This addition enhances the trail system's visual appeal while continuing the effort to place these unique silhouettes on bridges and overpasses throughout the community, celebrating Doylestown's collaborative spirit and history.







This spring, we encourage you to get outside and take advantage of the growing network of trails right in our backyard. Whether you're biking, jogging, or enjoying a leisurely walk, the Doylestown Township trail system offers an incredible way to experience the beauty of our parks and neighborhoods while staying active and connected.

# **Introducing the Doylestown Township Human Relations Commission**

Doylestown Township is proud to introduce the Human Relations Commission (HRC), a newly established Commission dedicated to fostering inclusivity and addressing discrimination within our community. Created under Ordinance No. 426, the HRC serves as a local resource for individuals who feel they have experienced discrimination and seek mediation to resolve disputes.

#### STRUCTURE AND MEMBERSHIP

The Human Relations Commission will consist of four appointed members, each serving overlapping four-year terms. A minimum of three members must either reside in the Township, work full-time within the Township, or own a business operating in the Township. The Board of Supervisors will appoint these members, ensuring a broad representation of the community's interests and concerns.

To further enhance its effectiveness and diversity of perspectives, the HRC may elect three non-voting, ex officio members. Additionally, a designated member of the Board of Supervisors will serve as a liaison, facilitating communication between the Commission and the Township leadership.

### **HOW THE HRC CAN ASSIST YOU**

If you live, work, or have visited Doylestown Township and believe you have faced discrimination based on one of the protected classes outlined in Ordinance No. 426, the HRC is here to help. The Commission can assist in addressing concerns and guide you through the process of seeking a fair resolution, ensuring equal access to housing, employment, and public accommodations. ### Keep Your Dog on a Leash: It's the Law & It's Courteous

Doylestown Township is home to beautiful parks and trails that welcome residents and their four-legged friends. However, to ensure the safety and enjoyment of all visitors, dogs must be kept on a physical leash and under control at all times while in township parks and



trails, as stated in Ordinance No. 386.

Keeping your dog on a leash isn't just a township rule—it's also **Pennsylvania state law**. The Pennsylvania Dog Leash Law requires that all dogs must be confined within the owner's property or under the control of a person when off their property. A leash ensures that your pet stays safe, prevents conflicts with other parkgoers, and helps protect local wildlife.

#### HELP KEEP OUR PARKS CLEAN

In addition to keeping your dog leashed, please remember to **clean up after your pet**. Township Ordinance No. 386 prohibits littering of any kind, including pet waste. **Always dispose of waste in designated trash receptacles** to help keep our parks clean and enjoyable for all.

### Drought Emergency Declaration Mandatory Water Conservation

Drought Update - March 26, 2025

The Doylestown Township Municipal Authority (DTMA) would like to update our customers on the mandatory water conservation measures required by the Authority. Due to the unprecedented duration of drought conditions, DTMA groundwater levels continue to decline. The latest PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) drought indicator status benchmarks and the conditions set forth in DTMA Drought Continency Plan require the Drought Emergency to remain in place.

### The measures enacted during this Drought Emergency include the following:

- Irrigation and watering of lawns is prohibited.
- Washing of cars is prohibited except for commercial businesses with recycled water.
- Fifteen (15%) to twenty percent (20%) reduction in household water usage.
- The serving of water at restaurants is prohibited unless requested by the customer.

Beginning late last year, DTMA requested voluntary reductions in water consumption from our customers. DTMA conserved water by delaying hydrant flushing, conducting a systemwide leak detection survey, and enacting other water supply management measures.

DTMA realizes the significance of these requirements and appreciates our customers' cooperation. While these actions on an individual basis may seem insignificant, collectively we can all help to protect our water supply.



### **Update on Drought Emergency**

As our area continues to experience record setting drought conditions, the Doylestown Township Municipal Authority (DTMA) remains committed to protecting our water resources. DTMA routinely monitors groundwater levels at various well sites throughout the township and surrounding areas. This information has been organized here to illustrate the fluctuating groundwater levels at these well sites with an emphasis on the general decline of the water table. The graph below shows the various DTMA wells, with the black line indicating the overall trend.



## **Dumping Yard Waste in Stormwater Basins and Open Space Areas is Harmful**

Stormwater basins and open space areas play a crucial role in managing rainwater runoff, preventing flooding, and protecting our waterways from pollution. However, some residents have been using these spaces as dumping grounds for yard waste, creating serious problems for the community and the environment.

### WHAT IS A STORMWATER BASIN AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Stormwater basins are designed to collect and manage rainwater, allowing it to slowly infiltrate into the ground or flow through a controlled outlet. These basins help prevent flooding, reduce erosion, and filter out pollutants before water reaches our streams and rivers. When they function properly, they support local ecosystems and maintain water quality.

### THE PROBLEMS CAUSED BY DUMPING YARD WASTE

While it might seem harmless to dump leaves, grass clippings, or branches into stormwater basins and open spaces, this practice causes numerous issues, including:

- Clogged drainage systems Piles of yard waste block water flow, leading to localized flooding and costly repairs.
- **Decomposing material** Organic matter breaks down and releases excess nutrients into the water, which can contribute to harmful algae blooms in local waterways.
- **Disrupted vegetation and wildlife** Dumping smothers native plants and creates conditions for invasive species to thrive, reducing biodiversity.
- **Increased maintenance costs** The Township's Public Works Department must divert resources to remove the debris, which ultimately costs taxpayers' money.

### **USE THE YARD WASTE SITE INSTEAD!**

Residents are encouraged to take their yard waste to our designated **Leaf & Yard Waste Recycling Site**, located at the New Britain Road entrance of Central Park. Yard waste is accepted on the 3rd Saturday of each month from 9 AM to 11 AM and every Tuesday from 9 AM to 2 PM. Please note, this service is available to Doylestown Township residents only (no contractors).

At the site, yard waste is properly processed into mulch and compost, providing an environmentally friendly alternative to letting organic material obstruct stormwater basins and open spaces. The site is located at the New Britain Rd entrance of Central Park. **GPS address: 337 New Britain Rd, Doylestown, PA 18901**.

### THE COST OF CLEAN-UP

Removing yard waste from stormwater basins requires valuable time and resources from the Public Works staff. Labor, equipment, and disposal fees add up quickly, and these expenses are ultimately paid by taxpayers. By disposing of yard waste properly, residents can help reduce unnecessary costs and keep our stormwater management systems functioning efficiently.

### WHAT STEPS ARE BEING TAKEN TO ADDRESS THE PROBLEM?

To combat illegal dumping, the Township will be implementing the following measures:

- Installing signage to remind residents that dumping is prohibited
- Public education campaigns to inform residents of proper disposal methods
- Increased monitoring of known problem areas
- Potential fines or enforcement actions for repeat offenders

### Pennsylvania Urban Nutrient Management - Spring Greening

#### **SPRING TO LIFE**

As the snow slowly melts away, the birds begin to sing and fresh life bursts from the soil heralding the approach of spring and lawn maintenance season. For the one million-plus acres of home lawns in Pennsylvania, selecting and implementing an appropriate lawncare management program to promote healthy and aesthetically pleasing lawns is not only important to homeowners, but is also essential to protecting our waterways.

#### **KNOW WHAT'S BEST. SOIL TEST!**

The first step to understanding what your lawn really needs to be lush, healthy, and green is to know what your soil needs. It is important to conduct regular soil tests to determine nutrient deficiencies that should guide fertilizer selection and application. Soil test kits can be purchased for a nominal fee from your local Penn State Extension office. Following soil test recommendations, reading fertilizer label instructions, and using a properly calibrated

spreader will ensure the right amount of nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium are applied,

while reducing nutrient loss and fertilizer cost.

#### SOIL HEALTH. IT'S THE BOTTOM LINE.

Maintaining a happy, healthy soil is imperative to your lawn's success. Soil is the foundation for your lawn and is home to a multitude of microorganisms that are essential for plant growth. Take the time to support your soil by incorporating some simple practices into your lawn care program. Your lawn and wallet will thank you.

- **Keep it open.** Routine soil aeration can help reduce soil compaction. Good soil structure is essential for proper root growth, healthy microbe communities, and the movement and exchange of water, air, and nutrients.
- Raise it up. Maintain a taller lawn by only cutting 1/3 of the grass blade with each mowing. Taller lawns slow runoff and promote deeper roots, which reduces lawn stress and improves soil structure.
- **Put it back.** Return nutrients and organic matter back to the soil by mulching your leaves and grass clippings.

For more soil management strategies, contact your local county conservation district or Penn State Extension office.



Good soil structure has adequate pore space between soil particles to allow for the movement of air, water, and nutrients into the root zone.

#### **GREEN LAWNS - CLEAN STREAMS**

Pennsylvania's 2022 Fertilizer Law amendments were developed to protect Pennsylvania waterways and the waterways downstream. As a bonus, following the limitations in the law will boost your bottom line by ensuring that your investment doesn't wash away. The 2022 law established the following nitrogen and phosphorus limits for turf fertilizer applications.

- Nitrogen is limited to 0.9 pounds of total nitrogen and 0.7 pounds of available nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. per application.
- No phosphorus can be applied unless establishing or repairing turf.
- Nitrogen and phosphorus rates can be adjusted based on soil test recommendations and/or if using an enhanced-efficiency fertilizer.

In addition to the nutrient limitations, the law also established application parameters to prevent direct movement of fertilizer nutrients into our streams:

- Do not apply fertilizer if a heavy rain event is expected.
- Keep fertilizer away from drainage ditches, storm drains, or water.
  - » Maintain a 15-foot buffer from the banks of all waterways.
- Remove fertilizer that lands on impervious surfaces (driveways, sidewalks, roads, parking lots).

#### **WORKING TOGETHER FOR CLEAN WATER**

With ever growing acres of managed turf in Pennsylvania, controlling what goes into PA waterways is ALL of our responsibility. Help protect Pennsylvania's waterways by being wise when you fertilize!
